Mature

Having the ability to consider someone besides themselves.

- 1. **Physically**: This refers to the completion of physical growth and development.
- 2. **Emotionally**: This involves the ability to understand and manage one's emotions, and to respond to situations in a thoughtful and balanced way. It includes qualities like self-awareness, empathy, and resilience.
- 3. **Social Maturity:** This encompasses the ability to build and maintain healthy relationships, communicate effectively, and cooperate with others. It also involves understanding and respecting social norms and expectations.
- 4. **Cognitive Maturity:** This refers to the development of advanced thinking skills, such as critical thinking, problem-solving, and decision-making. It also includes the ability to think abstractly and consider different perspectives
- 5. **Spiritually**: Spiritual maturity is not about age or how long you've been a Christian. It's about becoming more like Christ in your character, conduct, and relationship with God. Here's a breakdown based on various biblical principles:

Key Characteristics of Spiritual Maturity:

- 1. **Christlikeness:** The ultimate goal is to become more like Jesus (Romans 8:29, Ephesians 4:13). This involves cultivating His qualities such as humility, love, compassion, forgiveness, and obedience.
- 2. **Deepening Relationship with God:** Spiritual maturity involves consistent prayer, studying and applying Scripture, and seeking God's will in all areas of life (James 4:8, 2 Timothy 3:16-17).

- 3. **Fruit of the Spirit:** Galatians 5:22-23 lists the fruit of the Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. These are evidence of the Holy Spirit working in a believer's life and are indicators of spiritual growth.
- 4. **Humility and Servanthood:** Philippians 2:3-4 emphasizes considering others as more important than oneself and serving them with humility. Mature Christians are characterized by a selfless attitude.
- 5. Love for Others: Jesus said the greatest commandment is to love God and love others (Matthew 22:37-39). Loving others, even those who are difficult, is a mark of spiritual maturity.
- 6. **Perseverance and Faithfulness:** Hebrews 12:1-2 encourages believers to run the race with endurance, keeping their eyes fixed on Jesus. Spiritual maturity involves persevering through trials and remaining faithful to God despite challenges.
- 7. **Discernment and Wisdom:** Hebrews 5:14 talks about those who have trained themselves to distinguish good from evil. Spiritual maturity involves developing discernment and wisdom through experience and applying God's Word.

It's a Journey, Not a Destination.

Philippians 3:12-14 highlights that even the Apostle Paul saw himself as still striving towards spiritual maturity. It's an ongoing process of growth and sanctification that continues throughout a believer's life.

Key Scriptures on Spiritual Maturity:

- Ephesians 4:11-16: "And He gave some *as* apostles, and some *as* prophets, and some *as* evangelists, and some *as* pastors and teachers, for the equipping of the saints for the work of service, to the building up of the body of Christ; until we all attain to the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to a mature man, to the measure of the stature which belongs to the fullness of Christ. - **1 Peter 2:1-3**: "Therefore, rid yourselves of all malice and all deceit, hypocrisy, envy, and slander of every kind. Like newborn babies, crave pure spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow up in your salvation, now that you have tasted that the Lord is good."
- **2 Peter 1:5-8:** "For this very reason, make every effort to add to your faith goodness; and to goodness, knowledge; and to knowledge, self-control; and to self-control, perseverance; and to perseverance, godliness; and to godliness, mutual affection; and to mutual affection, love. For if you possess these qualities in increasing measure, they will keep you from being ineffective and unproductive in your knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ"

Initiator
